Mission Interpreter Report

Stories of Hope and Resilience-by Anna Short

In the last couple of months I have been talking about what Lutheran Disaster Response represents and now I will send you a story. The story this month is about a young man named Alex.

Lutheran and Mennonite programs equip Hondurans with holistic vocational support.

Gang violence. Domestic abuse. No means to put food on the table. These are realities spurring Hondurans to migrate to the U.S. Many feel they have no other choice but to make the risky trip. According to the Honduran Consular and Migratory Observatory, 282,000 Hondurans have been deported in the past four years, with no indication of the trend decreasing. But returned migrants are finding new life in Honduras, with the support from the ELCA, the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and the Mennonite Social Action Committee (CASM in Spanish). In response to God's call to love and serve our neighbors, the ELCA supports both organizations as they assist returned migrants with holistic vocational support.

One story is of Alex. He tried to migrate to the U.S. to reunite with his family there for employment opportunities. After three unsuccessful attempts, he connected with LWF World Service's program for returned migrants in Olancho, Honduras. LWF equipped Alex with education and seed money to start a pig farm. "LWF World Services has helped me a lot because I have gone through several trainings," he said. "Business plans, investments, human rights—these are all workshops I have attended." Today Alex supports himself and family members that remained in Honduras with funds from his farm. He dreams of growing his farm and, eventually, going to law school.


PLC Picnic

An author of several books, she has most recently written a book entitled, The Stories We Leave Behind-A Legacy-Based Approach to Dealing with Stuff. At the coffee hour following our worship, she spoke to us about her experiences with her parents when trying to help them. Most of us can relate to the situations she describes in her book, and she does it with good humor and practicality. **Thank you**, for giving us additional tools to use while dealing with sensitive emotions and situations.

August Message From Our Pastor:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

First, thank you for allowing me to take a week of vacation. I had a wonderful time with my family at Rockaway Beach. It is a lovely spot on the Oregon coast. If you have never been there, it is well worth the trip.

Now, August is upon us. It's time to start getting ready for the start of another school year. Later this month our streets will be busy twice a day as children make their way from home to school, so please drive carefully. Seventh Avenue is particularly crowded with children making their way to either Lutacaga or Hiawatha elementary schools, Othello High School or even kids from the west side walking to McFarland Middle School.

Lots of children will be on our streets seeking education. We are fortunate in this country that education is valued so much that our government provides it. That is not the case all over the world. There are many countries where parents must fund the education of their children or they simply don't go to school. Many of these countries are in Africa and in other developing countries. Much of the time parents in these places are poor. They are often subsistence farmers who work hard to just put food on the table and there is often little money left for things like paying for school.

I remember when Moses Nwaka was here describing life in Tanzania. He said the average monthly income for people there was \$45 dollars per month! Can you imagine a family of four living on that? Moses said he was living better because he is paid \$60 per month as the assistant to the bishop in his diocese. That still doesn't seem like a lot of money to me.

These families have to save year-round to simply pay for the schooling of their children. Schools may charge as much as \$300 per year per child for school, so you can see there are few opportunities for the poor people of Africa to attain higher education. Understand that the children of Africa WANT to go to school, but many simply can't afford it. Anna and I sponsor a child from Rwanda through Compassion International and we are grateful to know that she is able to go to school. She is nine years old now and doing well. Her parents have used our sponsorship dollars to provide her schooling, purchase farm animals and provide school supplies as Iranzi needs them. But not all children of Africa are this fortunate.

This is where Pilgrim Quilters come in. Every year in the fall the quilters gather school supplies. Every year they take those school supplies and put together school kits. Each school kit is supplied with four 70-sheet notebooks (wide or college ruled is fine), one pencil sharpener, one pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors like kindergartners use), five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers (it is important, for safety reasons, that the pencils are unsharpened), five black or blue ballpoint pens, one 2 ½ eraser, one box of 16 or 24 crayons (spring for the good stuff; the Crayola 24 pack is the best!), and one 30 centimeter ruler (make sure it has centimeters on it! Did you know that the United States is the only developed country in the world that still uses inches?!).

We will be gathering these school supplies all through August and into September. Feel free to drop them off at the church during office hours or as you come to worship on Sunday morning. Why should we care about children in a different country? Because the future of the world depends on it! And as Solomon wrote in the Proverbs, "Train children in the right way, and when old, they will not stray." (Proverbs 22:6) See you in church.


