June Message from our Pastor

Dear Pilgrims,

I cannot remember a colder spring in the Pacific Northwest. I think we even had frost in May, and I remember going to the Easter Sunrise Service at 7am Easter Sunday in my overcoat, gloves, and scarf. It was 31degrees Fahrenheit that morning. We even still have the heat on at church because it has not been warm enough to switch our system over to the air-conditioning system, and here it is, June already!

Scientists are quick to point to climate change as the cause of our cold spring. I will not argue with them, but it seems to me that sometimes the weather is just unpredictable. Sometimes we simply don't get what we expect. Sometimes we are surprised by what God brings in the weather.

It reminds me of something I learned when I was in seminary. I learned a saying that I have applied to much of my life since. My internship supervisor was fond of saying, "We plan, and God laughs." In other words, we make our plans based on expected circumstances and probable outcomes, but sometimes God changes things and makes it necessary for us to change our plans, sometimes very quickly.

For instance, imagine being Peter, whose original name was Simon bar Jonah. He grew up in the fishing village of Bethsaida on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. He and his brother, Andrew, made a decent living working as fishermen for Zebedee, who owned a small fishing fleet. Zebedee had two sons, James, and John, and the five of them got along well enough. They probably all figured this is what they were going to do for the rest of their lives. They were going to fish and provide their village with food for the foreseeable future.


That all changed when a man from Nazareth came to town. He called himself Jesus, and there was just something about him that stirred Simon, Andrew, James, and John to their depths. He spoke, and they simply couldn't help but listen. Even Zebedee seemed stirred by the way this man spoke about God and the way God loves each of them.

So, when Jesus suddenly turned to Simon and told him, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Simon simply couldn't help himself. He HAD to follow. He knew that if he didn't follow Jesus, he would never be able to rest comfortably again. Following Jesus wasn't an option, it was now a compulsion. Andrew, James, and John seemed to feel it, too, so they all left the fishing business and became disciples. It was as simple, and as lifechanging, as that.

I have a feeling God is at work at Pilgrim as well. The way we do ministry is changing rather rapidly. Just three years ago, we had a website and a Facebook page, but the content was written words and still pictures, and that was it. God didn't cause the pandemic, but God is using the pandemic as a way for us to expand what it means to be church. People are now able to attend worship without having to enter our church building. We have a livestreamed service, we record and post videos to our website, and we upload content to our Facebook page that gets shared all over the world. All that change in less than three years! It goes to show that Paul was right when he wrote, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to His purpose." (Romans 8:28) I wonder what else God will bring our way. See you in church and online.
