Newsletter Article for April 2025

Dear Pilgrims,

Through this season of Lent, we have explored the five senses God has given us. We have discussed how each of these senses is a gift from God, and how using our five senses enhances how we experience the gift of God's creation.

What occurred to me though, as I spent time meditating on all of the senses God has given us, is that they are all made primarily for receiving. We open our eyes, and we can behold the beauty of creation, but we cannot do the seeing for someone else. The closest we can come is with descriptions. We listen with our ears, and we hear the music of the natural world in the songs of the birds, the whispering of the wind, and the rustling of the trees and grass, but we cannot do the hearing for someone else. We take a deep breath, and we can smell the scents of the earth; the flowers, the leaves breaking through their buds into the new spring growth, and even the smell of the earth itself, with rich soil ready to provide abundance, but again, we cannot do the smelling for someone else. When we reach out to touch the leaves and flowers, our fingers feel the softness of the green leaves and the flower petals, but others must do the touching for themselves to feel the same things. And even when we eat virtually anything, we eat from the abundance of all that God has provided, but some people like different foods than others. We cannot taste something for someone else. All of our senses are for receiving, only.

All of these senses are given to us so that we are able to enjoy the world that God has created, but then, what is our responsibility to care for this gift? What can we give to others, so that they may also enjoy creation? I think this is where stewardship of the land comes

in. From the beginning of creation, humans have been in charge of taking care of the earth. Genesis 2:15 says, "The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it."

A properly tilled and kept garden will flourish for a long time, and that is what we have been called to do by God. But notice one very important thing; the garden still belongs to God! God never signed over the ownership of the garden to either Adam or Eve, or anyone else in all of creation. Psalm 24 begins with the words, "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it; for he has founded it on the seas, and established it on the rivers." (verses 1-2). God even comes right out and announces in Psalm 50, "Every wild animal of the forest is mine, the cattle on a thousand hills. I know all the birds of the air, and all that moves in the field is mine." (verses 10-11).

God has ruled the earth for millions of years, but God has given us the job of caring for it. In order to do that, perhaps we could be more mindful of how we use what God has provided. Let's take care of ourselves by trying to eat right and get a little exercise, and let's take care of God's creation by being more mindful with purchases. Maybe we should use plasticware less and the dishwasher more. Maybe we should collect aluminum and other recyclables. Maybe we should share wholesome foods at fellowship hour (although, I'm convinced that chocolate is a vegetable!) Let's be good stewards of all that God has provided because, "The earth is the Lord's" and we are just the tenants. See you in church or online. Peace,
